

Change: A Year in Review

Some days we look around the city and it doesn't look like much has changed. There are people who wish change would happen fast and those that wish it wouldn't happen at all. The fact is, change is inevitable.

The primary focus of the Community Development Department is to manage the changes that occur in economic development and residential growth. This department is the first place to see what is changing. Some of the changes moving forward include the development of townhomes, a proposed assisted living facility and redevelopment of the dilapidated gas station. We are excited to see how these projects progress in 2017 as tools have been put in place for them to move forward.

The residential growth in the City continues as 41 new residential lots opened in the Rum River Bluffs 2nd Addition subdivision. Currently St. Francis has only 11% (or 246 parcels) available for new construction, but those vacant lots are moving as 2016 brought us 33 permits for new homes. Permits also show households are investing into their homes through improvements as they choose to stay in St. Francis. According to a report by the Association of Realtors, home sales are up in St. Francis along with average sales prices. To help bring all the changes together and plan for the future, a planning effort known as St. Francis Forward is underway for the Bridge Street and Hwy 47 corridors. This will be another tool to guide the City in the efforts to provide quality residential and business growth. Message from your Mayor



As I write this, my last newsletter, I have been reflecting on my 14 years in public service for the City of St. Francis and want to thank you, the voters, for the privilege of serving you. I have

seen many changes over the years and am proud of the fact that I leave the council with the City on a solid foundation and poised for future growth.

We have had several inquiries lately with regards to stormwater grants from the Met Council. Staff has looked into this and found out that the City of St. Francis is ineligible for these. These grants are only available for Watershed Districts or Watershed Management Organizations.

Wastewater Treatment Plant Update: Last year we implemented a household income survey. Because of the results, we were eligible for an additional \$6,000,000 (round number) in WIF Grant funding from the State. Because the State Legislature did not pass the Bonding Bill, those monies have not been approved for disbursement. The Governor has refused to call a special session so the Bonding Bill could be passed. We currently have a loan from the Minnesota Public Facilities Authority for continued on page 3

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

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Recipe Corner Best Brunch Egg Bake! Recipe by Megan Krape

Ingredients

8 slices bread, cubed

- 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 1 cup shredded monterey jack cheese 10 eggs
- 2 cups milk
- 2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 2 teaspoons dill
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon white pepper
- salt
- 1/2 small yellow onion, chopped
- * Optional: Add chives, bell peppers, mushrooms, or broccoli.



Directions

- 1. Prepare a 9x13 pan (greased)
- 2. Spread cubed bread evenly; cover with cheese.
- 3. Beat eggs until light and fluffy.
- 4. Add remaining ingredients.
- 5. Pour over bread and refrigerate overnight
- 6. Bake for 50 minutes at 350 degrees or until set.

Winter Tips

When shoveling your driveway apron, shovel the snow to the right of your driveway if you are looking at the street, it will

reduce the amount of snow in your driveway when the plow comes by.



Please do not...

Do not blow, shovel, or push snow from your driveway into the street. It will end up back in your driveway from the plow and it is illegal.

Do not place your garbage cans in the street. Make sure there is a spot for them at the edge of your driveway.

Do not park your vehicle in the street. (No parking is allowed on any city street during the months of November through May from 1 a.m. to 11 a.m. and/or during a snow event. A snow event occurs when there is a snowfall of 2" or more and ends when the roads have been cleared to full width.)

'Tis the season

Now is the ideal time to check for drafts and seal air leaks around windows and doors. Some self-help websites suggest a candle or match to find air drafts, but there are safer options. A tool called a smoke pencil is available at most home centers and will allow you to detect drafts and air leaks. Another inexpensive option is a bulb syringe with baby powder.

Once issues are identified, you can determine the proper method of caulking or gasketing to resolve the issue. Be aware of freezing temperatures as this can affect the curing ability of many caulking products.

Programmable thermostats are now required for new construction homes and have proven to be a huge energy saver. Consider installing a thermostat that can adjust the temperature to be more comfortable when you are home at night, and lower heating costs when you are away.

Waste Water Treatment Plant Progress

Major progress since the last fall update includes:

- The Operation building is nearly complete. Electricians are wiring all the pumps, motors and process controls. HVAC work has started.
- The two clarifiers are complete. The protective domes have been placed on both and all mechanical equipment is working.
- Pipe work for the aeration basins is complete. Few minor finishes are left. Electrical work remains for this.
- The Bio solids tank is finished. City staff completed walk-through inspections.
- Crews continue to work on the Tertiary building. HVAC equipment is being installed. Process equipment continues to be installed. Electricians continue to install wire and cable for equipment. Aeration Pipe work remains.
- Pipe has been installed in the new influent lift station. Electrical work is nearly completed for this structure.
- Roughly 1200 feet of water main for the facility has been installed.
- Crews are finishing effluent pipe work.
- Crews continue to do site grading.

A Future Generation of Operators

Each year, we have 4th graders from Cedar Creek, East Bethel and St. Francis Elementary (11 individual classes this year), visit the City of St. Francis Water Treatment Facility. While in class, each student builds a mock water filter using household items such as pop bottles, coffee filters or cheese cloth.

The students later apply what they've learned in class to the water treatment plant while touring the facility. Both students and teachers can see first-hand how we filter iron and manganese from our drinking water.



Q & A: Utility Rates

The City will be implementing the second phase of the water and wastewater rate increases on December 1, 2016 for bills due January 10, 2017. At the June 1, 2015 City Council Meeting, the City approved rate increases for water and wastewater rates. These rate increases only apply to City Water and City Sewer users. Below are some frequently asked questions regarding the rates:

Why is the City raising rates again, they just raised them in November of 2015?

The City originally proposed to raise water and wastewater rates in the Spring of 2015. The proposed rate increases were supposed to be an 85% increase in wastewater and a 45% increase in water rates. The City realized that would be a dramatic spike in rates and decided to phase in the rate increases – about half in November 2015 and about half in December 2016, for bills due January 10, 2017. The overall increases ended up totaling 40% Sewer and 20% Water in November 2015 and 40% Sewer and 20% Water in December 2016.

Why is the City raising these utility rates?

The City is constructing a new Wastewater Treatment Facility that is planned to be completed by the Fall of 2017. The wastewater treatment facility was constructed for two main reasons. First, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) has standards for wastewater treatment and the City had issues meeting these standards. The MPCA has statutory authority to fine the City up to \$10,000 per day for noncompliance. Also, the new wastewater treatment facility allows for the City to grow and add additional connections to the water and sewer utilities. Prior to the new facility, the City had capacity to allow an additional 250 connections to the system. The City had approximately 256 residential lots that had at least received preliminary plat approval. The City also had approximately 23 commercial lots with an estimated 82 additional connections that could be added. Therefore, the City was on track to exceed the capacity for the system. These numbers do not include any new development opportunities the City could also accommodate.

Why does the City want to add additional users to the water and sewer systems?

Every new connection to the water system and wastewater system brings in \$3,060 and \$4,284 in revenue respectively. In addition, each new user helps drive down the cost to existing users through their monthly usage of the systems. Finally, having additional capacity allows for future development opportunities to attract or expand businesses, provide essential services in the community through development, and increase the population to expand the tax base.

Why are water rates increasing?

In 2006, a rate study suggested rates should be at \$15.00 for a base rate and \$5.00 per 1,000 gallons. Prior to the increases in 2015, the rates were at \$13.75 for a base rate and \$4.25 per 1,000 gallons. The combination of the slowed housing market around 2007 and the tough economic conditions resulted in the City using cash balances to offset any shortfall in revenues. Expenses in the water fund have continued to increase and the City is raising rates to ensure there is no shortfall in the water fund.

Ok, what is the final dollar impact this will have on the typical residential user?
